Ian Harvey, Chairman of the Fundraising Committee has already begun the process of seeking grants and the committee are organising a series of events during the summer to raise the profile of the project locally as well as money for its construction.

Belonging together

HE happiest moment during the Easter Services? It has to be the comment – 'I felt like I was part of a big family'. That's just what church should be. We are the family of God, his children, beloved, precious and we belong together. One of the great things families do is eat together at all those special occasions, Christmas, Easter, Birthdays, Anniversaries, Christenings, Weddings, exam results; indeed anything can be an excuse for a get together over food and wine. That's exactly what God's family do too. We get together and, as a family, break

We get together and, as a family, break bread and share wine to remember the day when God extended his invitation. through Jesus, to everyone to join him in his family. Like every family occasion there is a mix of people, all different, aunts and uncles, grandparents, mums and dads, children, nieces and nephews. Then there may be friends of the family those people we love who want to belong but don't feel that they are quite there yet - that's just like church too. It can seem if everyone else knows what to do, is part of the group, comes up to share the meal. But how do we become part of all that.

Like any family there is a sense of commitment in belonging. In a family the parents are committed to looking after their children, in caring for the elderly, in keeping touch with the extended family - and everyone reciprocates. At church the commitment is shown through Baptism and Confirmation. If we are Baptised as babies other people make those commitments for us - later we take those promises on ourselves at a service of Confirmation – we confirm our desire to be part of God's family, fully joined up, adopted by God the Father, brothers and sisters together. Its then we become part of the fellowship which receives communion, the bread and wine which reminds us of Christ's death and forgiveness - how he made us at one with God. It is our family meal.

The Church has established this tradition to give form and shape to the family of God, to offer opportunities for people to learn about Jesus and how, through history, the Church has explained his teachings. Conformation is a rite of passage to show that we have decided to fully accept God's love and enter into a relationship with him.

God's love is freely given, open to all, it does not depend on us being confirmed into a particular denomination. What confirmation shows is that we are ready to accept his love and his way of living that pours love into the world through us. Communion isn't so much a sign of God's acceptance, as our longing to be part of his Kingdom of love. Through the joy and closeness of the moment we receive God's blessing and strength to continue in his love and service.

As a church family we remember the wideness and generosity of God when we share the bread of friendship. We think about the way Jesus fed the 5000, never seeking to ask whether the people who received the food were 'members' of his group – and in memory of that we break and share ordinary bread, freshly baked. It is a reminder that God's love is everywhere and for everyone – taking the step into full membership is saying thank you to God and offering oneself in his service as part of his family for eternity.

Everyone at the meeting was whole hearted in their thanks to Eirwen and in their hope that she would soon have the operation on her knee which would allow her to return to her preferred active life.

The meeting also thanked Howard and Moira Watling for their years of unstinting service and sadly accepted their resignations from the Parochial Church Council. Between them they have served for several decades. For many years Howard performed the Herculean task of organising the staffing of stalls at the Annual Fete and Moira has been responsible for undermining the resolve of dieters by producing the most amazing Lemon Meringue desserts for a variety of church functions - from Harvest lunches to Advent Suppers and many fetes and festivals between. At the Vestry meeting which took place before the APCM Maddie was also elected as Churchwarden with Sue Ketteley.

Towards the end of the year it was decided by the PCC that it was necessary to establish a fundraising committee, drawing in other members of the congregation. Ian Harvey kindly agreed to Chair the committee and also to manage grant applications for the PCC. Ian was co-opted onto the PCC, as was Colin Hart who is heavily involved in two of our major fundraising projects. The fundraising committee held their first event at Epiphany with an evening of competitions and refreshments at the church - raising over £200 for the Annexe Fund. Amona the plans for 2017 are a cream tea and open gardens, a quiz and the annual wine-tastina.

With the retirement of Howard and Moira a further vacancy arose which has been filled by Joanne Lance. The PCC is now up to full strength and will be meeting on the 25th May to continue its work of overseeing the building of the new Annexe

The APCM is also an opportunity to thank all those unseen helpers who have no official title vet without whose work All Saints would not be the happy and busy church that it is. Each week the church is prepared for worship. The Communion is laid by Sue Ketteley, Ian Harvey or Stephen Wadman on the table covered by linen carefully starched and ironed by Kay Hill who has laundered the linen for many years. Every week different people welcome the congregation with a smile, a pew sheet and any necessary books. During the services others come forward to read the lesson. There are those who read intercessions and others who lead services. All this is co-ordinated by Lyn Cronin who has also taken on the refreshment rota for family services and has been a very able and efficient assistant to the Sue Ketteley, our Churchwarden over the past year. Lyn also helps on the fundraising committee, has taken on the task of organising the mailing list for the church from Eirwen Shepherd and has been an outstanding support in the many services – like Palm Sunday - where groups of readers are needed and rehearsals have to be arranged. Lyn has even led Morning Prayer when the Minster is away as have Sue Ketteley, Jane Burgess and Gordon MacLean. Without you all this church would not be the wonderful beacon it is in the community – thank you, each and every one of you, for all you do to express your ministry and your love of God in this place.

The APCM

THE Annual Parochial Church Meeting [APCM] is always held in April and is an opportunity to ask questions about the Report & Accounts and to vote for members the Parochial Church Council [PCC]. It is preceded by the 'Vestry' meeting. Every year around Easter time the Report & Accounts for the previous calendar year is published and is available for church members to read in Church or to take copies home. Everyone is invited to attend the annual meeting, which usually takes place a week or so after the Report & Accounts are displayed. The Vestry meeting is entirely separate from the APCM and is concerned solely with the election of the Churchwardens. After the APCM the new PCC meets for the first time to decide the date of its next meeting and to confirm the posts held by members of council.

In June [25th] Dengie Project Trust will be bringing their ideas for the new 'Knightswood' centre.

Care at Knightswood is coming to an end, but the Trust are planning to open a new centre thanks to an allocation of space on Fisher's Farms. In July [23rd] the Essex and Herts Air Ambulance are sending a speaker to tell us all about the essential contribution

that the air ambulance makes to our communities. In August [27th] our Archdeacon Elizabeth Snowden will be joining us for Choral Evensong.

Course in Christian Studies

- starts in September

VER had that moment – you know when someone casually mentions someone in the bible, or perhaps refers to liturgical colours or some other thing in Church - and you think - well I'd like to ask but.... Here's your opportunity to ask as many questions as you like and find out more about Christianity, its practice and its history. The Course in Christian Studies has been going for 30 years and has seen hundreds of students receive their certificate. Small groups of students meet in very different venues across the diocese to learn from tutors and each other about faith, the church and God.

This year we are starting the course here. It will begin in late September. Each session last about two hours and will take place on Wednesday Evenings at 34 Maldon Road, Burnham, the home of the tutors Ruth Wells and Jeff Burditt.

You will have the opportunity to undertake assignments leading to a full CCS qualification or you can follow the course and participate in the discussion without the written work and receive an attendance certificate.

Having the full CCS certificate opens the door to other training possibilities in pastoral care, preaching and lay ministry, but its main purpose is to develop the interests and understanding of the individual in the church and the Christian faith.

There will be a CCS taster evening at 8, Fernlea Road on Thursday 29th June, 7.30pm. Please don't be shy and think it's not for you. Come and meet Ruth and Jeff, ask your questions, explore the literature and meet other people who are in exactly the same boat as yourself – nervous, but interested.




